

If anyone has problems with the footpaths, please contact me and I will do my best to help.



bridleways and byways open to all traffic, unless given specific permission to do otherwise by the landowner. Permissive paths, unless granted in perpetuity, are at the discretion of the landowner, and may be withdrawn. A lot of the tracks in regular use are not rights of way. If they are abused, then there is the possibility they may be closed to public use.

Dog walkers are reminded that they are required to pick up after their animals. Bins are provided, and should be made use of. It is an offence not to remove the deposits from any public right of way. Your animal should not be allowed to mess on private property.

Further, although we are all trying to follow the social distancing guidelines, please stay on the paths, rather than trek across someone's crop. There are plenty of gateways and other areas to wait while someone passes at an acceptable distance without straying on to the fields. If we can stick by the rules, and clear up after dogs, then our pathways and bridleways will remain as safe as possible, and so shall we. If on your travels you find a right of way obstructed, please let me know, and I shall have it dealt with in as timely a manner as possible. Thank you for your co-operation.

### West Wratting Book Club

We are meeting via Zoom to discuss our books: April's book was 'The English Patient' by Michael Ondaatje, which was to have linked with the May Weston Colville film club. It is still hoped to do this when we are through the worst of this crisis. All felt it was well written but some had problems with the way in which events were ordered, in reverse and "darting around", while one person did not enjoy reading about the events covered in the story. Other comments were "beautifully interwoven", "had done a lot of research, a bit too much about the defusing of bombs". Some found these details and the insight that it gave into what the sappers were doing very revealing. However one of our number had checked some of the facts on this and other aspects of the story and found some major errors, not least that the supposed identity of the 'English Patient' cast serious aspersions on a real person and the mention of Geiger counters in relation to defusing bombs is a total fallacy. These glaring errors made it difficult for them to enjoy the book, feeling that the central situation was contrived and unbelievable. However, it was felt that the descriptions of the desert were very evocative and the Sikh sapper was a well-drawn and very





interesting character. His reaction to a particular piece of news near the end of the book could be easily explained as a natural outcome of the pressure he had been under for so long, and his conflicted feelings exacerbated by his brother's situation. Most of us had seen the film, which some had enjoyed and others not, in particular the fate of one female character. One person had approached reading the book with some trepidation as they had loved the film but found that the book added so much to the story, giving an insight into the characters' thoughts. Views on the ending varied, with some initial confusion amongst some, but it was thought by most to be a good ending. Scores

ranged mainly between 7 to 9 out of 10 but with one 5. All except the latter would recommend it.

Our book for May was 'Hamnet' by Maggie O'Farrell. This is a fictional account, based around what few facts we have about Shakespeare, his wife Agnes (known to us as Anne), his son Hamnet (interchangeable with Hamlet), and the events leading up to the latter's death (apologies if this is a plot spoiler) and the consequences, not least the writing of the play 'Hamlet'. There was an obvious relevance to our current situation in the references to the plague and how it was spread.

This is yet another book which takes us backwards and forwards between two periods of time.

Interestingly, Shakespeare is never named in the book, perhaps a way of concentrating our mind on the two main characters of the story, Agnes and Hamnet, one person commenting that it was nice to see the events from a different perspective. However, one of our number was disappointed that there was not more about Shakespeare's character.

All agreed that it was a very good read, and had enjoyed the author's style of writing, one reader describing it as charming. She struck a very good balance between the language of the time and modern

speech, with nothing that jarred. The author had obviously done a lot of research into the period, not least on the use of herbal remedies and medical treatment. We all thought that the descriptions of the grief of the parents and how they deal with it in different ways, as well as that of a twin, were very well described and very poignant. Scores ranged from 8 to 9 out of 10, and all would recommend it.

Our next book is 'Stuart: A Life Backwards', a biography by Alexander Masters, to be discussed at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> June. We usually take a break through the summer when people are away but, as things stand, we will be carrying on.

### Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

Welcome to early summer 2020. Isn't it quiet and peaceful, without the nitrogen dioxide and unburnt fossil fuels from traffic?

I'll pass on just one bit of good C-word news, then move swiftly on: sunlight causes oxidation. In other words, it's a bleach. Bleach rapidly destroys SARS-CoV-2. So if you're out and about, any sunlit surface, like gates and stiles, are free of any Covid-19 within minutes of a person touching them. Food for thought.

Your Marsh Tits are feeding chicks sixteen hours a day, as are most other birds. The chicks need protein to grow, so the parents are collecting insects and caterpillars to feed to their young, rather than the carbohydrate and fat-rich seeds and fat balls put into garden feeders. Tits in particular are now seen gathering prey from bushes around your feeding stations. Seed-eaters like Greenfinches are still hitting the feeders hard; my garden suet block gets regular visits from a female Great Spotted Woodpecker. (Male and female Great Spots both develop brood patches, so they share incubation duties.)

At this time of year a ridiculously large number of bird species nest right on the ground in short grass, eg. Chiffchaffs, Willow Warblers and Skylarks. Linnets,

even on a ploughed and planted field. You can see how small and vulnerable they are to disturbance (the hands have nothing to do with me – the photo is from BBC News). If you like the sound of

Chiffchaffs and Skylarks heralding summer, please be careful with your feet and keep your dog on a short lead in wild, grassy fields.



Speaking of

summer, the Cuckoos are back. Their famous call 'cuc - koo' is from the male or cock bird. The female, or hen, Cuckoo makes one of the weirdest noises you'll hear in the woods. Imagine a rapid bubbling noise, rather like the whickering of a horse. If you find that hard to imagine, listen to this link: https://www.xeno-canto.org/557857. If you hear this, keep your eyes peeled for a male Cuckoo coming arunning!

### The Meadow School

The last month at The Meadow School has once again been a strange one. The school has continued to stay open for key worker children and vulnerable families and as more people have returned to work, the need for school places has increased. It has been a pleasure to invite these children into school each day and help parents out. It has been so lovely to see these children find a routine for their day, with teachers and TAs helping them access learning in the morning, either on a 1:1 basis or in small groups. The afternoons have been a mix of creative arts and sports outside, which the lovely weather has allowed for.

Teachers have continued to work hard to provide online education outside the physical school building. Children have been accessing their work via Google classroom and teachers have been available every day to answer any queries and help when children need it. We are so grateful to parents who have been balancing helping their children alongside their own work.

One of our major concerns has been the mental health of our children during this time. In order to help, the PTA, alongside the school, funded a 'goodie bag' for every child to enjoy. Staff spent several days ordering, stuffing and delivering bags full of helpful and fun activities, including a sketch book, paints, sewing, playing cards, exercise books and even some chocolate! One of the highlights of this time was delivering the bags to each child, chatting to them from a social distance and receiving lovely pictures of the children enjoying their activities.

With different information and regulations being published daily, it has been a logistical challenge as to how to open for three different year groups within the restraints given. We have spent a lot of time with tape measures trying to ensure groups can fit into our

classrooms, with class lists to build 'bubbles' of no more than nine or ten children, looking at staffing these groups, and planning a school day so that no group



of children interact at any point. We have fully supported parents who have had concerns about children coming back to school, but we hope that our fully risk assessed plan will ensure that children and staff are as safe as possible, within the guidelines, when school does eventually return.

We do hope, along with everyone else, that school is able to return to normal as soon as it is safe. In the meantime, we continue to thank all our families for the amazing job they are doing.

While we aren't able to teach and interact with the vast majority of our students in person, we continue to be very proud of them. Their resilience, motivation and engagement with their learning at this challenging time is to be celebrated.
