

The book we read for July was the 2019 Booker Prize winner, 'Girl, Woman, Other' by Bernadine Evaristo. Ministry Matters

They don't happen often, do they, those kairos moments? Those turning points in your life. Those defining



moments when you know inside

your heart that everything has changed. Recently I have experienced one of those moments. I received confirmation that after years of interviews and assessments, my calling as a priest and pioneer in the Church of England has been confirmed. In the autumn, I will begin training at Westcott House Theological College in Cambridge, while continuing to serve in our wonderful villages.

Rev Simon Talbot, our area Dean, explained that I am the first Pioneer to be training and working in the area. I will also be the first Pioneer to study at Westcott. Pioneers model their calling on the life of Jesus, who came not as a revolutionary to cast aside all that came before, but rather as a pioneer, called to breathe new life into the world. As we all assess what the easing of lockdown might look like for ourselves and our loved ones, we encounter an important life changing choice. Do we return to all that we have known before or do we consider how we pioneer a





new way of being? Each and everyone of us faces a potential kairos moment as we reflect on what the easing of lockdown means for us as individuals, as families, as villages, as a nation and as a world.

One of the many interview questions posed to me focused on what makes me vulnerable. I replied that vulnerability is a strength which is often underated. As I wrote this article to you today, I have reflected on the beautiful encounters we have all had with each other in our communities. These encounters have often come about through showing our vulnerability to one another, by asking for help, sharing our fears or offering our services. This has facilitated the coming together of our communities in a new way, and in a way that many have said they would like to see continuing into the postpandemic world. I am reminded of the passage from Hebrew 12, 1-3: Do you see what this means – all these pioneers who blazed the way, all these veterans cheering us on? It means we'd better get on with it. Strip down, start running – and never quit! No extra spiritual fat, no parasitic sins. Keep your eyes on Jesus, who both began and finished this race we're in.

Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

Your Marsh Tits are starting to come back to your garden feeders again. After a conspicuous absence of several months, on 6th July there was at least one unringed Marsh Tit chobbling away in Len and Ben Eeles' garden in Weston Colville, and Red over White over Black 'Sumo', was seen with its face in the sunflower hearts at Joyce Oliver's bird bistro on Mill Hill on 11th July. Welcome back, All!

Sumo was ringed as a fledgling at Joyce's on 21st July 2018, so we can give this bird's curriculum vitae: she is an adult, almost exactly two years old. A wing length of 61 - 62mm means Sumo is likely to be female. Sumo's probably just come through her second arduous breeding season deep in the woods, so it's good to see her recharging her batteries back at Joyce's. She's clearly not frightened of the location, despite being caught and colour-ringed there. It adds to our evidence that ringing does no harm to these Red-Listed little creatures, even if ringed when recently out of the nest. It's the only reason I do ringing work – it adds to our essential demographic and phenological knowledge to save this declining species, and does no harm in the process.

This year's crop of youngsters are still unused to windows. They're still bashing their heads on glass



and stunning themselves. Our latest accident is a beautiful Treecreeper, shown here after being picked up by Len and Ben Eeles. The bird was lucky to be found by this family of naturalists. Ben helped the bird recover and it flew off in 10 minutes.



The sharp-eyed amongst you will have seen the few small, wispy feathers in Ben's hand. This is because in mid July, Treecreepers have already started their normal annual moult. They're getting rid of their worn-out or baby feathers and growing a fresh set, ready for winter.

Please also keep your eyes peeled for juvenile Cuckoos, which in this area have probably been raised by Dunnocks. Cuckoos are extremely rare now. We'd like to know how any of them are doing, wherever they may be. This is a photo of a juvenile Cuckoo,

perched on a garden table in Weston Colville, loudly begging for food from its host parents. Their begging call sounds like this: https:// www.xeno-canto.org/ 572567/download

Adult Cuckoos are already on their way back to the Congo. They had reached

A lot has happened since the last parish council news in the April issue of Challenge, so I am just going to give you the basics of our last parish council meeting, held in the village hall on 13th July. Details for the approved minutes will be in September's Challenge.

Election (postponed from the May 2020 meeting): Cllr Nichols will remain as chairman and Cllr Bonfield will remain as vice chairman. Cllrs Roberts and Davey agreed to continue as representatives on the Sports Pavilion Committee and Cllrs Nichols and Bonfield will continue to represent on the village hall committee.

Planning:

20/01564/FUL – Solar Farm: a decision was made to object to this planning application.

20/01893/CLIED – Certificate of Lawfulness re the new playground. This has not yet been received.

Finance: the audit has been carried out successfully but formal approval of the accounts, bank reconciliation and various audit documents was required due to the cancellation of the May meeting because of Covid19, although approval by email had been given. These were approved and agreed.

The Romanies – Update

About 16 months ago I wrote about the Romany family who settled for some time in Fox Lane. After writing they left, and reappeared in late June this year.

Much has changed in their lives in the past year and a half. Jean 1, the matriarch, has moved into a bungalow in Fordham, as has her daughter, Jean 2, and her children now go to school. There was no sign of the older boys and husband. I asked Jean 1 if she was happy in the bungalow, and she replied "I don't know" and "I'm bored".

Jean 1 was staying in Fox Lane with her son, Robert, and his children, Robert, Jonathan and Diana (who is training to be a midwife). Robert is based in King's Lynn and had, I think, been asked by his mum to take her on an outing to her old haunts.

Robert was talking Romany when I met him, but changed to English when Jean came out of the caravan, and freely admitted he could neither read nor write. He was, on the face of it, running the show, but admitted he is very much under the thumb of his mum (aren't we all?).

As usual, there was a lot of mess, some generated by themselves, but a lot dumped on them by outsiders, thereby passing the blame to the Romanies. They

were getting ready to leave when I met them, and the next day they were gone. I tidied up what I could and consolidated the larger pieces into one heap for the council to collect. Usually the council leaves bin liners at encampments like this, but none were forthcoming this time – perhaps the council was unaware of the situation? (I'm checking this.)

Their Norfolk Terrier, Buddy, was not in evidence. He had been stolen, but Robert had got a brown and white Bitzer puppy called Roxy, so all was well.

And so this Romany family is gradually fading into 'normality'. Are they happy about this? I'm not sure. Will Jean 1 settle in her bungalow, or will her yearning for the smell of wood smoke and the freedom of the road get the better of her? I'm pretty certain where I'd put my money.

The Annual Parish Meeting has been postponed until 2021. The meeting on Monday 6th July was held virtually, and included the following:

Public Participation Session – a parishioner spoke about the Ivy House development listing six points he wanted raised. Another parishioner expressed safety concerns for children being dropped off and collected by the school bus outside the development, and how noise would be mitigated etc.

Planning – the following applications were discussed:

20/02430/FUL – following a discussion it was determined to neither support nor object to the application, and to raise the following comments on the Greater Cambridgeshire planning department -1) concerns over access: Highways had objected to the application. concerns were raised over safety particularly for school children catching the bus, and a request that an access/delivery plan was put in place; 2) parking: the plans show two spaces per property, with only one visitor parking space; concerns were raised that this was not sufficient, as the road outside the development has cars parked along it;



3) privacy: a condition was requested that the skylight windows on plots 2 & 3 should not be changed in the future to dormer windows as this would impact on the privacy of the neighbouring property, and that a wall is built to replace the current barn wall, not a fence;

4) disappointment was expressed that the two senior properties had been withdrawn. These had been mentioned during discussions with the architect in March.

Covid-19 – thanks were expressed to the parishioners who had helped those in need across the village during the pandemic. When it is safe to do so, a Village Event will be put on with the Reading Room.

Footpaths – a request for more footpath and bridleway signs has been made. The proposed new route for Footpath 19 has been mown, but there have been no notifications. A loose handrail on the bridge at the junction of Footpath 18 (Weston Colville Parish) and Footpath 15 (Carlton Parish) has been reported.

Free Tree from SCDC – as agreed at the meeting on 2nd March, a single specimen of silver birch (var Snow Queen) has been purchased and was planted in the area of grass between the village pond and the stream at the end of March. The tree appears to have established well and put on some healthy new shoots.

The college community has responded brilliantly to the challenges of remote

learning and reinventing schooling overnight. It was great to have around 200 of our students on site for our various provisions in the summer term, including critical worker childcare, supervised study, Year 10 face to face subject seminars and mentoring/ counselling sessions.

Later this month we are planning to welcome back our Year 11 students to collect their GCSE results. This year has proved particularly challenging for this cohort as their examinations and leavers' celebrations were cancelled.

The Centre Assessment Grades that will be awarded to our Year 11s on 20th August have been generated through teachers submitting a rank order of predicted grades, based on their best professional judgements. These grades have then been subjected to centralised exam board moderation, involving benchmarking against historical performance of LVC students in different subjects. It is a very uncertain time for our young people as they await the outcomes of this process and the impact that this may have on their next steps. We wish them all the best and commend them on their maturity at this time.

Meanwhile, the college's staff are busy preparing to fully re-open the school in September to all students. The adjustments to school routines and practices will be significant. We are implementing year group zoning and staggered break and lunchtime, amongst many other measures, to achieve a safe learning environment.

Re-opening the Community Sports Centre has also required lots of modifications to provide our

customers with safe access to the fitness suite and other facilities. The Sports Centre team is delighted to welcome members of the community back. Thanks to all of you who support the college through membership and use of this Village College community resource.
