West Wratting Book Club

For February we read 'The Venetians' by Bill Matthews. Now a Cambridge resident working for the university, he previously lived and worked in Turkey, Italy and Canada.

The story is based upon the real diary of a young medical doctor, Nicolò Barbaro, and also uses the contemporary 'The Fall of the Byzantine Empire' by George Sphrantzes, another major character in the story. It follows Nicolò's adventures, in particular, his sea voyage to Constantinople, where he arrives as the Ottomans, led by Sultan Mehmed, are building up their forces in preparation for the fateful attack on that city (comparison to current events was unavoidable) and his development both as a doctor and a person. The author has done a lot of research and, although very detailed and interesting historically, it was felt by most that there was no real depth and characterisation and it "fell between two stools", neither a straight history book nor a truly rewarding novel.

Those who had spent time in what is now Istanbul enjoyed the mention of places they knew. There was also some uncertainty about the description of medical thinking and treatments, despite the comparatively advanced knowledge of the Ottomans.

Parish Affairs

When the going gets tough . . . well, I guess there's always chocolate.



Perhaps that's what's inspired the supermarkets to stock their shelves with Easter eggs from before the end of January. But I doubt it. Regardless, like the increasingly early arrival of spring bulbs, the effect was curiously disconcerting as much as it might have been welcome. Was Easter really going to be that early this year? No.

Because the date of Easter is a calculation based on the lunar cycle, confusingly (and something the commercial world doesn't like) it's different every year. So, just in case you're still disorientated by early Easter eggs, Easter Sunday is not until 17th April this year. Phew!

However, Lent has just started, some six weeks or so before Easter, on 2nd March: Ash Wednesday.

In ages past, encouraging Christians to embrace the traditional disciplines of Lent – penance, prayer and self-denial – was probably never an easy 'sell'. Certainly, over the past two years of lockdown, and Covid fears and deaths, it seemed rather out of place to look for the value of placing more burdens on oneself. And this year, too, but with a different set of unprecedented stresses piling on – soaring energy bills and inflation, and tax increases – yet again, many may feel that any whole-hearted embrace of whatever is

the point of Lent is compromised. After all, why add extra self-imposed austerity?

Yet, is there a way to recast the extra disciplines of Lent as something genuinely helpful for us at this juncture of personal, and indeed global, worrying uncertainties?

For Christians, I think there is. That is, when we recognise that the real effort of Lent is about daring to focus the mind, and heart, on the scandal*, the absurdity of our nonsensical claim about God. For as Lent proceeds, we are heading towards the events of the trial and crucifixion of this particular innocent man whose death most reveals God, in His glory.

It's this impossible paradox that Christians especially revisit in Lent, year after year, after year. And slowly, very slowly, we learn to see how Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead reassures, and releases new life and steadfast love . . . and confidence in whatever the future holds.

And then we tuck into our stockpile of Easter eggs! *Alistair Collen, Granta Vale Ministry Team*

Jackie Romanis – an Update

Jackie left Weston Colville for the last time in June last year, so no more wobbly bike rides down the middle of the road to watch out for as she headed to West Wratting to play the organ on Sundays or to practise during the week.

The dementia she had desperately fought against finally took hold, and she was taken to a nursing home in Bottisham, a new adventure where she found comfort in the daily routines, in between receiving visits from her friends in the village.





My mum loved her house, the garden, volunteering and recycling, but most of all it was the kindness of her friends and neighbours that she most enjoyed. She tasked me and my wife Elaine to keep her in her house as long as possible and I hope we did this. Her friends were very supportive, though I know many people complained about her behaviour or state of dress at times; to these people I apologise. Dementia is an awful condition and I hope you never have to experience it.

Teaching was Jackie's life long passion and she enjoyed watching her pupils develop. She held senior positions at Newcastle University, then taught in Vanuatu in the South West Pacific for many years, before returning to take up a position at Dullingham School. In retirement she set off with a friend on a three month trek through the Himalayas, before returning home to work in her garden and making time to volunteer at Audley End.

Jackie is a very private person and highly protective of her independence, calling herself a "tough old bird". She never let anything get her down and would fiercely stand her ground no matter what. There were some bitter memories from her time on Mill Hill but a positive approach was always taken, and obstacles quickly dismissed.

Nature Notes

Spring is here! Our six-year-old Marsh Tit, Black over Red 'Moaty' turned up again at Church End, Weston Colville in mid-February. He was three hours behind an unringed Marsh Tit, but we're still hopeful that Moaty has paired up for the breeding season. Len and Ben Eeles are on his trail, so hopefully they'll have more news soon. If you see any colour-ringed birds, please let us know at cambsmarti@gmail.com or Challenge.

We're losing the winter visitors now, so if you see Redpolls, Siskins, Fieldfares, Redwings, Bramblings and Ring Ouzels, it's probably online or in a book.

Spring is heralded by Snowdrops. For me, if there are Snowdrops gracing your garden, it can't be winter! They have a surprisingly long flowering season, starting with Galanthus 'Barnes' and 'Mrs Macnamara' in October and finishing with the likes of 'Danube Star' in April. There are about twenty species across central and southern Europe. Their unstable genetics and willingness to interbreed has led to around 2,500 varieties. The most well-known species, Galanthus nivalis, has been growing wild here since the late 18th century. The varieties can look very similar, but are distinguished by leaves, scapes, pedicels and ovaries as well as the colour, markings and shape of the flowers.

apart in Galanthus) tepals. Usually, the



three inner tepals are smaller, have a notch and various markings, the outer three are larger and plain. Poculiform means the inner tepals look larger and plainer like the outer ones; inverse poculiform means the outer tepals have markings like the inner ones.

Here are two inverse poculiform snowdrops: a single 'South Hayes' and a clump of 'Trumps'.



Snowdrops can fetch silly prices, especially yellow varieties: the aptly named Galanthus 'Golden Fleece' is offered at over £200 per bulb, while a single bulb of the beautiful Galanthus woronowii 'Elizabeth Harrison' was auctioned to Thompson and Morgan of Ipswich for over £725 (it's said to have died).

Despite their delicate looks, most Snowdrops are as tough as old boots. Their shoots are tipped with antifreeze compounds, so they can melt their way through ice and snow. Galanthus 'Rosemary Burnham' survived being dug up by Squirrels to come though and delight my other half Eileen! Give them sharp drainage, spring sunshine but not summer sun and dryness, and they'll multiply and repay you year

Shingles vaccine – who is eligible?

Adults 70 to 79 years old

You only need to have the shingles vaccine once and you can have it at any time of year. Whilst it is a very effective vaccine, some people can develop shingles at a later stage, but the illness will be milder. It works well in people who have had shingles before, and it will boost your immunity against further attacks.

There is a new vaccine available for people who are immunosuppressed called Shingrix and this is available at all of our surgeries as a two-dose course.

Pneumonia vaccine – who is eligible?

- Babies, as part of the national immunisation programme
- Adults aged 65 and over
- Children and adults with certain long-term health conditions, such as a serious heart or kidney condition.

The pneumonia vaccine protects against serious pneumococcal infections and encourages your body to produce antibodies against pneumococcal bacteria.

If you have a long-term health condition you may only need a single one-off vaccination or a vaccination every five years, depending on your underlying problem.

Flu vaccine – who is eligible?

- Adults 50 years and over
- Have certain health conditions
- Are pregnant
- Are in a long-stay residential care
- Receive a carer's allowance, or are the main carer for an older or disabled person who may be at risk if you get sick
- Live with someone who is more likely to get infections (such as someone who has HIV, has had a transplant or is having certain treatments for cancer, lupus or rheumatoid arthritis).
- Frontline health or social care workers.

If you are not eligible for a free NHS 'flu vaccine you can buy one from your local pharmacist. Granta Pharmacy in Sawston have stocks of 'flu vaccine; to book an appointment call 01223 727530.

Covid vaccine – who is eligible?

- People aged 12 and over
- Some children aged 5 to 11

Adults have two vaccinations plus a booster dose. People with a severely weakened immune system are offered three doses plus a booster. Please note that it is never too late to start your Covid vaccine course.
