





#### Kingsway Solar

This is a proposed solar farm, with solar panels and battery storage areas to be located on parcels of land in the vicinity of Balsham, West Wratting, Weston Colville, and Weston Green.

The public consultation will run for six weeks from 31st October to 12th December 2024. This is an opportunity for the public to share their views before a further, statutory consultation in 2025.

Your involvement is vital. Please read further details on page 2, and in the parish council minutes on pages 8 to 11.



#### Kingsway Solar

This is an announcement from the developers.

The first stage of consultation has opened on a proposed solar farm in the South Cambridgeshire area. Kingsway Solar would have the potential to supply around 500 Megawatts (MW) of electricity to the National Grid and, if consented, as an NSIP (Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project), Kingsway Solar will have to apply for a Development Consent Order (DCO) under the Planning Act 2008 and go through an independent examination managed by the Planning Inspectorate.

The solar panels and battery storage areas are proposed to be located on parcels of land in the vicinity of Balsham, West Wratting, Weston Colville, and Weston Green. An approximately 14 km transmission connection to the National Grid's proposed new substation at Burwell South, to be located to the south of the existing substation at Burwell, is also required. The predominant technology for this connection will be an overhead line, with undergrounding where necessary.

The proposal is being developed by DRD (Downing Renewable Developments), a certified B-corporation with significant experience in owning and operating renewable energy, battery storage, and other infrastructure.

The public consultation will run for six weeks from 31st October to 12th December 2024. This is an opportunity for the public to share their views before a further, statutory consultation in 2025.

There will be an online webinar on Monday  $2^{nd}$  December, 6.00-7.00 pm, open to members of the public to view our proposals and speak to members of the project team. To register online and for more information, visit:

#### Solar Farm Feedback

This is our best opportunity to influence the design of the solar farm so that if it does go ahead its impact on our lives will be minimised.

Use any of the methods described on the back page of Kingsway's leaflet, or if you prefer you can just write to them at FREEPOST DOWNING KINGSWAY.

Do tell Kingsway your overall feelings about the solar farm, but for this consultation focus on giving constructive suggestions that could influence the design for the better. It will be most effective if you say "it should be like this because . ." rather than "if it's like that it'll be terrible". If describing a particular location, eg, "the view from my house", give enough detail so it can be identified.

If you want to protest about the solar farm the best time to do that is after the 12<sup>th</sup> December consultation deadline, when you, the parish councils and Kingsway Solar Community Action can collaborate to do that most effectively.

#### Tea & Cakes




#### West Wratting Progressive Supper 2025

#### From the Rectory

Here we are, in the festive season, looking ahead to Christmas but also with the invitation to savour Advent.

I love Advent time. I know it may seem anachronistic in our modern world, where Christmas trees go up at the beginning of December and shops get in the Christmas swing of things long before that, but I think it still has much to offer, both to those who follow the 'church year' and for those who may feel they are on edge of the Christian faith, looking in to see what they can see.

Advent indeed may offer us a pause, an opportunity to step back from the hustle and bustle of the lead up to Christmas; to recover some of the mystery and deeper excitement which Christmas ought to have, and to ponder the life-changing message conveyed by these simple words: that Jesus is 'Emmanuel, which means, 'God is with us'. Who is greeted at his birth, as Luke's gospel says, as 'Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord'.

We may enjoy different ways of marking the special time of Advent: perhaps through the doors on an Advent calendar or through lighting an Advent candle. I like to do this on each day of Advent and enjoy some time just quietly looking at the flickering flame. The symbolism of lighting a candle may also be seen through our Advent wreaths. Traditionally, each Sunday in December a candle on the wreath is lit as important Biblical figures are commemorated, because they helped to prepare the world and us for the birth of the Christ child.

These kind of Advent customs take for granted that we should walk slowly and intentionally towards Christmas, really noticing our surroundings, and not just rush into it headlong. They also remind us of the

art of waiting, a waiting that rests not in frustration or frenzied anticipation but in stillness; we may savour the future whilst still embracing the present.



#### West Wratting Parish Council

At the meeting held on 11th November the following items were discussed:

#### Open Forum for Public Participation -

A parishioner reminded the village of access to a fund of approximately £80,000 from the Wind Farm developers, for the purpose of improving local infrastructure. Individuals/organisations may apply for grants from *Cambridge Community Foundation*.

A parishioner identified that the council and the electorate should be proactive in producing an objection to the proposed solar farm development rather than standing by.

#### Council business -

It was resolved to approve the grant of £25 yearly to the Royal British Legion for a remembrance wreath.

Further research into the matter of remote attendance at parish council meetings is required and councillors will investigate to ascertain whether a response is required.

It was resolved to approve for the clerk to attend four planning webinars by CAPALC.

**Finance** – full details of the authorised payments and receipts are shown in the minutes available on the website or noticeboards.

#### Planning -

Solar Development – there will be a private meeting between the parish council and Kingsway Solar Farm on 12th November and a public meeting on 16th November. A poll had been circulated to approximately 200 parishioners via the Chassen magazine and a Google form, and 40 replies had been received. The majority of responses are against the proposed development.

It was noted that Pippa Heylings MP is also opposed to the proposal and that the chair will meet with her imminently to discuss further.

The chair had attended the Kingsway Solar Farm Community Action Group meeting for information gathering purposes.

The chair will endeavour to obtain guidance on the above matter from CPRE (Campaign to Protect Rural England).

It was resolved to organise an extraordinary meeting of the parish council in December for the purposes of conducting a joint meeting and alignment between the parish councils of Weston Colville, West Wratting, Balsham and Carlton/Willingham, and KSCA. Also, to discuss status and give guidance to parishioners on submitting feedback to Kingsway, and for WWPC to make a formal statement about their position on the solar farm.

Randswood Farm – the following response had been submitted with regard to application 24/03836/TTR, hedge works at Randswood Farm: the application states that the reason is 'to allow required visibility splays for the principal farm access'. In plain English, this means to enable vehicles leaving the farm to see well in advance any vehicles approaching from the Haverhill direction.

Local residents have responded both for and against this application. One has registered a strong objection to removing a well-established hedge on environmental grounds, whereas others have said that it is very necessary for road safety reasons.

Members of the Parish Planning Sub-Committee have considered this application. We all agree that it would be very regrettable to remove this hedge from the environmental perspective. However we acknowledge that vehicles travel fast along this road, sometime well in excess of the speed limit, and that it is very difficult for vehicles to exit the farm safely when these are approaching from the Haverhill direction. The view is very obstructed on the right by the hedge.

We thus on balance feel that the hedge should be modified to improve visibility. Removing over 100m appears to us to be excessive and it may be possible to modify it in another way to allow safe exit. We thus recommend the County Highways Department is consulted to establish how much of the hedge would need to be removed, before a decision on this application is made.

Lambs Yard – it was noted that the archaeological survey was due to commence on 18th November at the Lambs Yard site, and any findings will be displayed on the village website. There may also be provision for a physical display, dependent on the findings. The Wildlife Area must be maintained for at least the first year by the developers, and then it would be taken over by the parish council on the provision of certain conditions, albeit fully funded for 10 years.

It was suggested that signposting of the amenities and wildlife activities would be useful.

The developers are required to procure a report on the potential costs of maintaining this area, and that it will be shared with the council on receipt. ETA approximately the end of 2024.

Village Hall – it was noted that the parish council, Village Hall Management Group, and Dyason Developments have now established a good working dialogue.

West Wratting Sports Pavilion Club – the chair will submit an application to the Cambridge Community Fund for the provision of a grant for repairs and redecoration of the exterior of the club. It was resolved that in lieu of grant funding (if no longer available) the parish council will allow the club to use a percentage of the sink fund in order to carry out the repairs, on the premise that this fund is replenished by the club as a priority.

The fire brigade had been contacted to update the legal maximum capacities within the venue.

#### Small Assets -

The playground equipment has been checked and is in working order.

The grit bin outside the village hall had been damaged by the demolition contractors of Lambs Yard and it will be replaced at their expense in due course.

The defibrillator has been checked and is OK.

A fence post near the basketball area is damaged and will be repaired imminently.

#### Road Safety, Highways and Footpaths -

The LHI (Local Highway Improvement) application was successful and will require a £2,000 contribution from the parish council, to include road markings and gating.

The 20 mph application was not successful in 2024 but can be updated for consideration in 2025.

Advice has been sought from Susan Rooke at SCDC with regard to a representation two residents would like to make about road safety concerns on Six Mile Bottom Road.

An update on footpaths from the Paths Officer was noted.

The 'active travel hierarchy questionnaire' was distributed by Cllr L Chandler.

#### **Kingsway Solar Farm Public Participation Session**

– Cllr Vidler started the session by advising that as a break from the norm, up to half an hour would be allowed for the discussion on the Kingsway Solar Farm Proposals. He advised that the company had many proposals across the country, and at this stage they were looking for as many views as possible from residents through the initial consultation, running from 31st October to 12th December. Cllr Vidler had found information online (*stopscottonsolarfarm.co.uk/*) about stopping another solar farm, and that some of the points could be used in this case.

Questions raised from parishioners included concerns over the flooding risk; whether there could be a more public defence, along the lines of 'Muck Off Haverhill'; how to get as many people engaged as possible to complete the consultation; why Weston Colville was not hosting a public meeting, when Balsham and West Wratting had dates set. The parish council would try and arrange a meeting with Kingsway in Weston Colville that would be open to the public, but also recommended that people attended the meetings in Balsham or West Wratting. It was also reported that a Balsham Community Group had been set up about the solar farm, which people could join. Further information could be found at https://kingswaysolarcommunityaction.co.uk/information/

The parish council welcomed the views of parishioners.

Flooding – the Stour behind The Green/Horseshoe Lane had been cleared; Cllr Harvey was asked to investigate whether the work would be carried out annually. The ditch by the Reading Room and along the recreation ground had been cleared. The Highways Officer had commissioned a consultant's report into the flooding on Common Road, seeking longer term solutions. A parishioner was thanked for clearing the culvert and drainage between Old Orchard and Stour House.

**Bridleway 14 Diversion Consultation** – it was determined to support the proposals. Both hedges would remain, but would be faced back to widen the bridleway. (*Bridleway 14 runs towards Lower Wood.*)

**Footpath 16 Diversion Consultation** – no comments were to be made on the proposal, as the footpath would follow the fence line. (Footpath 16 is at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane, behind the houses.)

MVAS – The former Cllr that had been looking after the MVAS (mobile vehicle activation signs) had asked to step back. He was thanked for all his hard work. Cllr Russell volunteered to take on the responsibility, and present the data at meetings. Stepping back from the shared scheme was also discussed, as the technology was very outdated, and hard to access. The clerk will raise it with some of the other shared parishes.

**Greater Cambridgeshire Partnership (GCP)** 

Presentation – Cllr Vidler had attended a GCP presentation. There would be a new park and ride – transport hub, in Babraham, which would link a guided bus way to the Addenbrookes campus. The new South Cambridge station was under construction, and would have four platforms. Plans for the expansion of the facilities at Addenbrookes were revealed including a new A&E building, plus a children's hospital and oncology hospital. The campus would extend towards Babraham, and would be completed over the next 15 years.

**BT Digital Voice** – Cllr Batchelor was asked to chase this, as the PC was not sure how to proceed.

Grass Cutting Tenders, March 2025 – November 2027 – the clerk will circulate letters to contractors, aiming to make a decision at the next meeting, but allowing time to push it back to March if necessary.

**Poppy Appeal** – £15 will be donated for the Royal British Legion Poppy Wreath.

**LOL's Pizza** – A request had been received for LOL's Pizza to park in the Reading Room car park once a month to serve food. The proposal was approved





Village Event 2025 – it was reported that the Reading Room Committee would be happy to support an event, if it was organised by the parish council. Insurance would need to be checked. It was suggested that there could be a joint celebration of VE Day and officially opening the new playground in May.

**Playground** – work on the first stage of the playground renovation (works inside the fenced in area) were to commence on 11th November. An update was required for the funding gap for the second stage. It was suggested that the Thurlow Estate or Field Compost could be approached for a donation towards the playground. Once funding had been sourced, the deposit could be paid on the second stage of the playground development (works outside the fenced area).

#### District and County Councillor's Report (extracts)

Kingsway Solar Farm – the proposal by Downing Renewables/Kingsway Solar for a very large new solar farm on the land between Balsham, West Wratting and West Colville, will be moving forward for informal public consultation starting on 31st October. This is an 'informal' consultation being run by the proposers of the scheme, who are looking to gather local feedback on the plans, as they currently stand. We understand that this consultation will involve public events, an online webinar as well as marketing material to be posted to every property within a kilometre of the proposed site.

Given the size and scale of this scheme, the decision to approve, or not, will be made by a central

government planning inspector, rather than any of the local planning authorities. This would be a major development covering a very large part of our countryside, so please do engage if you have any views on this proposal.

#### **Cambridge South East Transport (CSET) Update**

- the upgrades on our stretch of the A1307 over the past five years have been a part of a wider package of upgrades in South Cambridgeshire to improve transport to and from Cambridge and employment sites. Those that have kept tabs on this will recall that there was a proposal for a new Transport Hub (Park & Ride site) just outside Babraham and a new off-road bus route linking the new hub to the hospital site. This part of the scheme had stalled over the past few years but is now moving forward; the County Council agreed to proceed to the next stage, which is to present a business case to a government inspector, who will decide whether this proposal is sound or not.

An important part of this scheme is that the Linton Greenway, which currently finishes in Abington, can't progress until there is an agreed plan for what will be happening on the Cambridge side of the A11.

**Household Support Fund** – the County Council manages a fund called the Household Support Fund which is aimed to support individuals who are in receipt of benefits. #### Balsham Gardening Club

The club enjoyed a stimulating talk on 7th November by Clive Boase of local charity Climate Change Gardening. The expected changes will be challenging for gardeners, especially hot droughty summers, unpredictable late frosts and intense rain.

Clive gave us ideas for adapting to and softening the changes, for example by planting dry gardens and shade trees, storing more rainwater, growing perennials instead of annuals, mowing lawns less, and providing ponds for wildlife. We can reduce carbon emissions by using electric tools and peat-free compost, and we can capture carbon in the soil by less digging and more mulching.

Clive explained that individual actions do matter, with domestic gardens the third largest UK land use, and 25 million of us enjoying gardening. He finished with a checklist of achievable actions, and pointing us towards the *climatechangegardening.org* website for more ideas.

At the AGM, the club reluctantly decided to close at the end of December. Our membership has fallen to a low level and it is difficult to find committee members. We decided to donate the remaining club funds to local charities. We all thanked the committee for keeping the club going this year, with fascinating speakers on topics from thatching to winter gardening, a garden-themed Christmas quiz, and visits to some lovely gardens.

Our final meeting, on 4<sup>th</sup> December, will be for Christmas food and drink, preceded by a talk from John Gibson on 'The History of Medicinal Plants at the Papworth TB Hospital'.


#### 140 Years Ago . . .


